A change in the MARINA ASPO event of September 13,1980. Instead of a "Banked Slalom" event, it will be a "TIGHT SLALOM" similar to the one at the recent SKATERCROSS ASPO. It'll be a 50 meter, with cones placed 6'3" to 6' even. For more information, call Dennis Ogden at the Park.

Speaking of ASPO, this last week, the SKATERCROSS ASPO drew 180 entries. Once again the show lasted approximately 12 hours to run. As in the Del Mar event, everything ran very smooth, so there were no delays. The length of the competition is simple because of the number of entries.

Back to MARINA. The park has decided once again to make wrist guards mandatory to all skaters. EXCEPTIONS, will be all GOLD CUP registered Pros. They must wear gloves. All other skaters will have to purchase or rent wrist guards in order to skate. The reason: Dennis explains, that although his accident ratio is very small compared to the number of skaters that go through the park, when there's an injury, 90% of the time is the wrist. Similar statistics are corroborated at other parks. SKATERCROSS has had wrist guards mandatory for over two years, and they report only two wrist fractures in that period.

Talking about safety equipment, Don Hoffman has a new type of wrist guard in the market. It's called IMPACT #1. For more information call him at the park.

Our Editor has requested that all contributions of pictures and stories or results be dated. We appreciate all the info we get, but it will make it easier if you could include the pertinent data: ie; date, name of the park or event, address of association. In the case of photographs, please put the name of the location, skater and photographer. If you'd like the picture(s) back, enclose a self addressed-stamped envelope. This will make our coverage more complete.

Speaking of the same. You skaters out there, it's your responsibility to put down, when entering any event, who are your sponsors, that is if you want to give them credit. Many entries read like old Greek writings. Take a little time out and if you're sponsored by more than one manufacturer, give all of them credit. Sometimes, that's the only way the media finds out who's your sponsor.

It would also be a good idea, if some of the manufacturers would send this paper a list of their current amateur and pro teams. We're having a difficult time figuring out who's skating for who. It seems that teams change from week to week, according as to who wins an ASPO or a GOLD Cup. We know of several manufacturers who don't know all of their team members from the past week.

The Pepsi Team Challenge at' SENSATION BASIN has been moved up again and is now scheduled for the Thanksgiving weekend, instead of Florida's rainy Labor Day. Many Florida's Pros called

to request a change of date due to travel and West coast contest commitments.

The traveling VARIFLEX Tour is now in high gear, and as of this writing, the team is about to leave CROFTON Park in Maryland, and head South to Florida. Increadible stories are filtering to us about the tour. (See story in this issue). The bottom line: Skating is alive and well in the midwest and East Coast, with lots of energy. So much so, that Gil and Jannet Losi are very impressed with the caliber of some of the skaters. To quote "the locals out here are as good as some of the top West coast skaters".

Glyde Ryde, out of Tempe, Arizona have done alot of work to put together accessories for skateboards and roller skates to offer maximum performance. Items such as "speed washers", "pro shims", "skate lube" and others, they claim to give you that extra edge in competition. Send for their catalog. Check their ad in this issue.

We've got to take our hats off to the skaters and promoters in the North West. More specifically to people like Doug Hitch and the CASCADE SLALOM ASSOCIATION. Talking about nightmares, almost every contest they put on up there is affected by weather conditions. It's not unusual for them to be in the middle of competition, like ramp contests, and having to stop and move the ramp, crowd and skaters to an indoor facility and continue the event. Then when it stops raining, they just cart everything out again and continue. Now, that's dedication and also being prepared.

Further proof of their love for skateboarding up there.

At a recent CASCADE race, all the open class recers refused to take any of their prize money and gave it back to the CSA to help run the organization. Their next contest is on August 16-17, in Bellevue, Washington, at College Hill. They'll have a LUDGE event, DOWNHILL, GIANT SLALOM, 80 Cone SLALOM and Dual 40 SLALOM. Our roving reporter and former SkaterCross manager, sales rep., TOFT mentor and skaters limousine service, Jaron(Jer) Lucas, finds himself in the middle of Saudi Arabia. Doing what, you ask? Looking for the raddest skating surfaces. Check his report in this issue.

A word from ASPO to all manufacturers. Unless a skater is planning to switch from a 1A or 2A (unsponsored) division to a 3A or Semi Pro division, do not flow any equipment to them. There are several skaters now under investigation by the league as being sponsored although still competing in the 1A or 2A classes. What will happen if it turns out to be true, is that said skater(s) will loose all ASPO points. If you want to sponsor someone, you may do yourself and a the skater a service by calling ASPO and letting them know. The circuit has been set up to allow all skaters to move up and eventually get sponsorship or turn professional, but it has to be done above board.

We've heard an unbelieveable statistic out of Washington D.C. In the past 18 months there has been over 1 million roller-skating related injuries in the U.S. This is everything from a minor scrape to back and leg injuries of a serious nature. And people said that skateboarding was dangerous. Yet we don't see roller rink operators or rental shops making safety equipment mandatory as the people in skaboarding did.
The truth of the matter is that the Roller Skating lobby is much stronger than the skateboarding lobby in Washington. Most operators

are united and they flow enough cash in the right places to keep adverse publicity out of the media. Yet, with the few remaining skateboarding companies and people, we still can't get it together and let the word out about skateboarding. It's all possitive.

First of a series of interviews, is in this issue. The subject, Bert LaMar. Check it out.

BIG O will soon have a giant, plexy-glass, tubular, water slide in their premisses. Scheduled for the first of the year completion, the dual 600 + foot slide will criss-cross above the BIG O's skate runs into a giant swiming pool. Cost of the project, an unbelieable \$800,000!

Another park that's adding other recreational activi ties, to supplement the ska-board income is SKATERCROSS. Under construction and due is their MINI BAJA Radio Controlled OFF ROAD cars. They will have an off road track, complete with jumps, sand, banked turns, figure eights and more, and will have the radio cars for rental and retail. Lou Peralta owner of the facility is also into real "off road" racing, having raced in many of the BAJA and SCORE, MINT events and many of his racer friends will be on hand to keep their edge up on the MINI BAJA racing facility.

HI-ROLLER Skatepark, in Boulder, Colorado has scheduled a "KING OF THE HILL" Skateboard event for AUGUST 29,1980. The Park will fly eight PRO skaters, at the Park's expense, as a result of a lo-



GUEST EDITORIAL

MANUFACTURERS STOP IT!

A few weeks ago, I attended the ASPO season opener at DEL MAR SKATERANCH.

I happened to be in the pro shop/entry area, the evening before the event, when some of the park teams arrived to practice. Amid all the excitement and bustle of the arrivals, I was struck by the fact that some of the teams were equipped with new boards, in one case, all from the same manufacturer.

I was aware that teams were comprised of both sponsored and unsponsored skaters. Knowing this, I expected to see some new equipment and also some veteran equipment as well.

But I didn't. I thought this was strange.

When I asked the park manager and a few others about it, I was shocked to find out, that it was quite common for some manufacturers to "flow" equipment to some promising "unsponsored" amateur skaters.

It's obvious for anyone that has been around skateboarding for a while, that a good rider influences those around him to use the same brand of equipment as he does. It's also obvious that this is the cheapest form of advertising for the manufacturer, since it get's directly to the customer, one to one, up close and personal.

Certain manufacturers have taken it upon themselves, for their own personal gain, to pervert the whole concept of amateur competition.

Upon further investigation, I found out that this situation manifests itself principally in two different ways.

Both injurious to the rider, the pro shops and in reality, to the whole fabric of the sport itself.

This is what I discovered:

TYPE ONE. What I will call
type one is the direct flow.

A manufacturer's rep. will give equipment to an unsponsored rider because he's showing some promise or just happens to be looked upon the local park skaters.

The results are these:

- 1.) The skater loses his sense of proportion in the world(ie. everything is free to those who have talent) The opposite affects those who aren't as talented. They feel that everything is closed off to them and only a select few will have blessings(parks, equipment, attention) showed to them.
- 2.) The incentive to do well becomes, free equipment, not victory. The trophy or ribbon has meaning only in that it will get the rider free goods.

What ever happened to the traditional rewards for hard work and achievement?
Of self satisfaction for a job well done.

Free equipment shoots all these values down the tube and consigns victory to the dusty wasteland of avarice and greed.

TYPE TWO:

This type is perhaps more insidious than type one. Perhaps not so much in the moral level, but on the economic system in skate-boarding, which we've worked to build up.


This type of "flowing" goods to skaters, strikes at the economic heart of our sport.

In this situation, the manufacturer gives his team riders more equipment than they can possibly use, fully knowing that their riders will sell this equipment at reduced prizes for pocket money. Often sold on the parking lots of skateparks.

This alleviates the sponsor from heavy cash outlay for his team.

In my job as a sales rep. I have been in retail outlets where skaters come in and ask to see a certain produc

RESEDA, CALIFORNIA AUGUST 2,1980

SKATERCROSS SKATEPARK WAS THE HOST PARK FOR THE SE-COND ON NINE EVENTS SCHE-DULED FOR THIS CURRENT ASPO SEASON.

The park provided skaters with a new surface to skate.

Most had not skated the new pool(converted from the original 12'), so early in the week, many made their way to Reseda from all over Southern California to test it out.

The general reaction was that the 8' pool is hot and perfect..."kinkless".

While it may be a bit small for some of the larger skaters, it still afforded everyone the opportunity to try their raddest tricks without the fear of a nasty fall to the bottom.

It is the perfect pool for the younger kids and it's perfect to learn new wild tricks.

SKATERCROSS would have had over 200 entries, at least. But during the week before the Saturday event, the Valley filled up with a heavy layer of smog(unusual) and temperatures above 105!

Over twenty skaters had preentered, that did not show up on the day of the event.

Unfortunately for them, on Saturday morning, a cool sea breeze came into the Val and cleared and cooled the day to a bearable 95 degrees. Perfect for heavy competition.

Not only did the pool please everyone, but the tight Slalom course set for the event, did likewise.

In other contests, some of the cones had been placed in spots that made it difficult for a lot of skaters to negotiate the entire course. Not at Reseda. The cones were placed 6' 3" appart for the first 12 cones, (except the first two off the ramp, which were offset) and the last four were set at an even 6' apart.

Looking over the heat sheets, there were very few "DQ's" visible.

A digital electronic system was used to give skaters their times up to 1000th of a second.

The full length of the course was 130, from the bottom of the starting ramp.

As always, the Slalom event finishes before the pool competition, so about 4pm. all skaters had made their runs and some, were on their way home, while others had to wait to make their pool run.


As always, with so many entries, there's very little practice time for all.

The standard complaints were overheard from some skaters.

The trick is that you've got to get to the park at least a week before the event to get all the practice you want, because it's not going to happen on the day of the event.

The next ASPO will be at the OASIS Park in San Diego.

They've had just as warm temperatures, but they do have a nice sea breeze that may help. In any case, it looks like it may draw over 200 entries for August 16.

Many have been asking to possibly make the affair a two-day contest.

This is seriously being considered, although it may not be tested until the MARINA ASPO in September. There was not enough time to let everyone know for the next contest.

Scheduling will be done so that classes can get both of their events, within a couple of hours of each other.

The SKATERCROSS ASPO started at 10am as scheduled and finished at 10pm.

The entire day, was without hang-ups or delays and all the events ran very smooth.

So the facts are; that if you have 180 plus entries, it's going to take at least 12 hours to run them through.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE EVENTS:

SKATERCROSS took the overall Team points with 750, to COLTON's 683, for second place.

Third was PIPELINE, followed by SKATE CITY, DEL MAR, BIG O, MARINA, LAKEWOOD, and OASIS.

The BIG O Team should have brought the Park Team trophy to give to the event's winners, but did not think to bring it. So that's one that's owed to SKATERCROSS.

The current PARK TEAM overall standings now put the SKATERCROSS Team in first, followed by PIPELINE and BIG 0.

There are some old names atop of the class standings and some new ones.

Once again, Doug Cobalis leads the Park Team 12 & under class.

Bill Wahl, new to ASPO leads the 13-14 park team and Todd Joseph(Del Mar) has the 15-17 edge.

Jim Coane(SkaterCross) has assumed the lead in the open class, park team.

In the 1A division it's Youree Henly leading the 12 & under class.

Richard Ito and Mark Chase are co-leaders in the 13-14 division.

New face in ASPO is Jason LaFay, who's showing lots of style in the points lead in the 15-17 class.

Open 1A is also lead by a new comer to ASPO; Mark Bailey.

The 2A division has most of the top Unsponsored skaters from last season, except that current leader in the 12 & under class, David Mollen, a new comer to the league is holding a slight lead over Paul Hiniker. Paul Young has resumed his dominance in the 13-14, 2A class, while Scott Dreyer has a four point lead over Rick Tracey in the 15-17.

Ket Douglas, once again is showing the way in the Open class, although he's going to have to work hard to stay ahead of James Murphy and Marcos Monroy.

Little Chris Miller is now with the "big boys" in the 3A, SEMI PRO division.

He and Ken Stelmasky now lead the way in the 12 & under class.

SKATEBOARD USA'S BEEFY KEY-HOLE PROVIDED A REAL THRILL FOR THE OUT-OF-TOWNERS WHO turned a minimum of practice and new transitions into gold.

USA's keyhole is 13' deep by 32' across and has an 18" mouth with an almost unworkable shallow end. Sure, the deep end has a "kink" (faster transition than the opposing walls) but every pool has its own personality.

The 'in-town' locals from neighboring parks have not really liked the pool's omicus "depth", but since the complainers could not agree on the real problem, the answer became obvious when the out-of towners displayed what sound skating and serious practice enables.

Once again, wet weather destroyed the full potential of interested spectators and competitors. Rain began in the early morning hours and finally subsided around 2:30pm. All the meets have been scheduled for 3:00pm. and have luckily skipped cancellation by minutes.

Thanks to careful scheduling, we've been able to finish the contests with ease.

Judges, this time around, were Ron Zaulocki from Endless Summer, Jay Smith from Powell, Kevin Tate from Apple, and myself.

Glen Friedman from Skateboarder, was on hand shooting the locals up with dreams of a national debut. The 12 & UNDER event gave way with Jex Harrison protecting his perfect score and Chris Phillips, from Apple, contending with unusually vert terrain from his home grounds.

The 13-15 group had Shawn Scott from Ramps East, outstyling Mark Northrop from Cosmic Wave. Shawn has, so far, been the smoothest skater produced from the Midwest, with compliments from Jay Smith. Mark Northrop delivered an outstanding routine which included bio-backside airs and hairy roll-ins.

In the 16 & OVER division, Bill "Fergy" Fergusson from Endless Summer, ripped the left wall and the two local ripsters, Mark Carpenter and Todd Cadoo right along with it. Although the judging was very close, Jay Smith personally awarded 1st place to the skating of Todd Cadoo for utilizing the entire pool. Bio-handplants and airs seemed to score higher points for Fergy, as he also scored well on Elguerios and fakie varials. Mark Carpenter pulled off his maneuvers with no real problems as he dominated the "vert" with mastering moves.

All in all, the contest was not all that it could have been, due to a megaphone, poor music stations, and sound system. We most certainly won't have that action at Endless Summer, the next location come Aug. 23.

In parting, I think all you dedicated skaters should stop trying to intimidate new comers and instead, welcome them to your area. They support your park and in turn, support your interest. KEEP SKATIN'

VARIFLEX TOUR

TRAVEL UPDATE:

THE VARIFLEX TOUR...

REPORTS COMING IN FROM THE ROAD, INDICATE THAT NOT ONLY IS THE VARIFLEX TEAM setting the skating parks ablaze wherever they stop, but also that as a great surprise to the members of the tour, "there are some really great skaters out here!".

In our recent conversation with Jannet Losi at CROFTON Skatepark, Maryland, she indicated that so far the tour has provided a whole new insight, as to what's going on, skating wise, in the rest of the country.

According to Mrs. Losi, there are some excellent parks, first and second generation, that have not received enough credit or coverage from the magazine.

Furthermore, even in areas where there's still a first generation park (no pools) some of the skaters are pulling off maneuvers that heretofore, were recognized from West coast, pool skaters only.

"These kids are really good"
Mrs. Losi explained, and it
seems that most of what
they have learned is from
Pros coming through or from
pictures, which is a fantastic feat.

One of the most underrated parks, according to Mrs. Losi is SKATE N' SURF in

Greenfield, Wisconsin. "It is one of the best layedout and designed parks in the country", Jannet says.

Their Oasis-type Keyhole and the Skate City-type Clover Leaf are great skating surfaces. Also, the parks can operate year-round, with what we believe to be removable sections, for outdoor skating during summer and enclosed for the cold winter months.

The VARIFLEX TEAM has voted unanimously that CHERRY HILL's "egg bowl" has to be the best in the country.

It has the smoothest and fastest surfaces of any pool in this country and it's our understanding that the Team has blazed new trails for the locals.

The VARIFLEX Team has been welcomed everywhere they have arrived. Well, almost.

SKATE USA, in Warren, Michiqan, appearantly knew they were coming, but when the Team arrived, the owner was not there, and no one knew what to do, and finally, they packed up and moved down the road to ENDLESS SUMMER, where they were welcomed with open arms.

ENDLESS SUMMER had a contest the next day, and the Team helped on the judging, which just stoked every one there.

The NEW WAVE skatepark in Pittsburgh, Pa., while it's

FLORIDIAN Mike Folmer spent a couple of days in the Gulf Coast in Pensacola, Fla. before going back to Orange, California for the rest of the Gold Cup series.

Mike, who is in excellent shape for the series, did an interview for Mike Apperson's "Relating to Skating" radio show.

Mike cut his visit short due to the flat surf and 100 degree weather.

MIKE APPERSON has broken John Huston's 53 mph record by 2 miles per hour, at Lookout Mountain, Tenn.

The event which was broadcast live in Florida, by Radio Station TK101 has been swamped with inquiries about the event.

The run was video taped for showing later on Televison, with the excitable boy, Mike Apperson, sporting green hair by Head Hunters of Florida.

All this time, the two ladies are looking at each other dumbfounded, they're speechless.


A few more seconds later, Eric goes over to the machine, opens it and pulls Freddy out.

FOCUS: BERT LA MAR

JULY 23,1980 RESEDA, CA.

Ed. Note: Bert LaMar has been a Valley resident for most of his youth. Skating local pools, pipes and then SkaterCross when it first opened. Bert, at 15 years old, has gone through alot of changes in his young life. He's done more than most 20 year olds have ever dreamed of doing. The notoriety and popularity he has received because of skateboarding, at times has been trying for him, but he has learned to handle it very well.

This interview was conducted on a balmy, beatifull Val evening, atop of the famous SkaterCross ramp.

SKN. Bert, how long have you been skating?

BL, "Umm...well, I started skating streets about four years ago. When the park opened here(Reseda) I started skating bowls about 3 years ago. SKN. What was your first board?

BL. A JC Penny(laughs) fiber-glass board with urethane wheels.

SKN. What did it cost you?

BL. About \$15.00 bucks (laughs), we got it at a store near my house.

SKN. After the JC Penny model, what came next?

"A J.C. Penny Board..."

BL. Then I got a Val Surf and some bigger urethane wheels for the parks; cause I went to Carlsbad for my first attempt at a park.

SKN. That was the first park you ever skated. What did you think of it, like; walking into the place?

BL. It was wierd, cuz I was like, the littlest person there. Me and my friend.

Everyone there was much older.

My friend didn't want to ride the bowls, but I did, I really wanted to try the bowl. I liked it. It was something I wanted to do. From then on, I could tell I knew that's what I wanted to do.

SKN. In other words, once you got into it and you skated the bowls, you felt you were going to enjoy it and that's what you'd want to do?

BL. Yeah...soon as I got in there, I fell in love with skating(laugh)

SKN. Did you feel at that time that your board was adequate for bowl riding or did you want to make a change?

BL. Yeah, I wanted to change boards right away. 'Cause everyone had different stuff. They had thicker boards and plastic boards and all kinds of stuff, so I wanted to change really quick.

SKN. What was your really first good board for bowls and banks?

BL. A Toft board. When they first came out, the Toft was the first wide board and I used Indy trucks, I was riding a long time ago, but now I'm riding Trackers.

I like'em much better, and big wheels, like the snake wheels. It was the first wheel I had that was really good for the pools, like Oxnard and Surfs Up, like that.

SKN. You started skating parks in Southern California. When was the first chance you had to skate other parks outside of California?

BL. Umm... you mean back East and stuff like that? Well, first time I went back East was when Steve Olson and some other pros went back to Michigan and Cherry Hill and skated a bunch of parks back there.

SKN. Is that after you got on SIMS or before?

B.L. That was after. I've been on SIMS for a while.

SKN. Ok, let's backtrack a bit. How did you get onto the SIMS Team?

BL. It was at Oxnard. I had been skating and it was a

photo session and Brad (Bowman) had just quit G & S and got on SIMS, just that night, he got on SIMS for the photo session. While I was there, they told me to put some SIMS stuff on and just see how I worked out for the photo session, and I've been on ever since.

SKN. Right after the photo session, were you fully sponsored or they just gave you stuff?

BL. Yeah, after the session they just gave me some stuff and said to "see how it works out".

SKN. After that, I remember you turned Pro at BAKERS-FIELD. Is that right?

BL. Yeah, it was the qualifier for Oxnard. I made like a hundred bucks. There weren't that many people there and me and Jay Smith and Arthur Viecco went down to qualify for the Oxnard event.

SKN. So from there you went to Oxnard. How did you do?

BL. I didn't do so good. I didn't even qualify(laughs). I jelled out.

SKN. I remember your mom or dad telling me once that you tried jumping off your roof and over a Van. Is that right?

BL . Yeah,...I've tried some stupid stuff, like jumping off the van and finally I got in the paper and got some pictures in the paper by jumping off the van. They took pictures and stuff. Then I hurt my hip when I fell on the asphalt and that was my fault.

SKN. Have you ever broken anything?

BL. Umn...nah, I sprained my thumb, nothing serious, a couple of fingers, but I've never broken anything.

SKN. Ok, once you got past trying to make yourself known and recognized and you were on a team, people started to recognize you, how did that feel?

BL. I was starting to feel better cuz then I was doing better in contests. It was just pushing me, my skating was pushed alot.

SKN. Did you ever think when you first bought that JC Penny board that all this would be happening to you?

BL. Nah...I didn't think nothing, just like the kids on my block, we just like to skate. Then some of them dropped out, and I got into other things but I still



kept skating. And I never thought I'd get a board, (his model by SIMS) or compete or anything.

SKN. I know your mom and dad follow you to all the contest. How do they feel about you being a pro and all that?

BL. Well, they think it's fine, they're glad I'm doing something, instead of just sitting around smoking pot.

SKN. What about your relatives. What do they think about you skating?

BL. Well my relatives, you know, they think it's great. But they don't really know much about it.

Like my aunt, she doesn't know anything about skate-boarding and when she was out here, we took her to Reseda(SkaterCross) and she just flipped out.
Watching people skate, she

Watching people skate, she was just going crazy. She wanted to go home, because she was dizzy and stuff.

SKN. There's alot of top Pros and amateurs that came out of the Valley. Who do you think are some of the better Val skaters?

BL. I like Brad and Shreddi

(Repas) if he'd keep skating and Jay Smith, Deano Mueller and John Harris. Those are about the main pros now. There are some guys like Morro(Monteniero) and some of the older skaters that sort of quit.

SKN. What do you think of the new crop of skaters that are competing in amateur events? What do you think of their style, progress, etc.?

BL. I think it's really great. That's where all the new pros are coming from.

Amateur circuits like ASPO

"I want to continue skating for a while"...

and that sort of stuff is great. Alot of them are now turning Pro and I think that's good, cuz, it gives us more competition.

SKN. I know you're still young, but how long do you think you'll stay in skate-boarding?

BL. Well, it's really fun now so I'll be skating for a while. I'm also into ski racing, so I'll do that during the winter months and then get back into it again.

SKN. The LaMar board that's out now, is that your design or is it something that Tom Sims put together?


B L. Yeah, Tom Sims kinda worked on it and put my name on it. You know, he says "here's your product" and that was it.

SKN. In other words, you had nothing to say about it right?

BL. Maybe the color or things like that, the cosmetics, but nothing in the shape.

SKN. Obviously you're happy with the shape, but is there anything you'd like to change, perhaps a different model?

BL. I'd like to come out with a , more like a street skate for the kids, you know. Down in the super market, that can't afford a real good board, you know for the pools. I like to have a cheap board so every kid can ride down the street and stuff like that.

BL: I want to continue skating for a while. I hope I place good in the Gold Cup.


And then I want to turn Proskiing and just really get into snow racing this year.

This is incredible! How can an industry stay healthy this way?

The answer is that it can't. Not in the current economic situation.

It's hard enough to make it, without your very own industry undermining your right to survival. No park or shop can last too long.

The irony is that now it has become a status to get a "deal" anytime you buy any-

There's a lot of peer group pressure to always get the equipment cheap. If a kid has to pay full price for any equipment, he's put down for it.

This I believe, affects the kid's attitude about everything.

They start ripping off food from markets, clothes from stores, etc., why not, everyone else is trying it.

A teenager is in the formative years, what they learn during those years, they will carry for the rest of their lives.

Do we want to continue to give them the impression that it's just that easy to get free equipment. Or should we concentrate on the basics of what we're trying to do.

To create a sport that not only gives them satisfaction, pleasure and yes, some rewards, but more importantly it gives them a sense of accomplishment and self discipline.

I think it's time for us to clean up our act, for the sake of the sport and for the sake of the youth.
