





MARINA PRO BANKED SLALOM

PRO BANKED SLALOM Marina Del Rey Dec. 2,1979

Something may be wrong in the structure of Pro competitions, because this weekend we saw one of the smallest turnouts for a Pro event in a long time.

Dennis Ogden, with the able assistance of former Marina manager, Ray Allen, put together a fine program of competition and not in the least, a sizable Pro-Purse.

Yet, there were only 21 Pro skateboarders and 13 Pro Roller Skaters battling for the cash.

Ironically, on hand, there were many Pros, who for one reason or another, decided not to enter this event.

This speaks for the basic problem many promoters have.

It was a Banked Slalom race. Many of those Pros that did not compete, considered themselves either too slow to have a chance to place well, or they felt they're strictly pool or bowl skaters.

Perhaps, now is the time to change the whole structure of Pro competitions, so as to encourage Pros to compete in every kind of event a promoter puts on, and to stop or prevent some of the promoters from loosing their shirts.

Not that Marina loss, but it is this reporter's opinion that the profits may have been marginal and certainly not encouraging to do it again or to convince other park owners that it can be done.

On the other hand, the competition was a good show.

Those Pros who entered, showed the tenacity and dedication necessary to win any type of Pro event.

Right from the start of practice, it was obvious that the man to beat was Santa Cruz/Indy's top skater, Steve Olson.

Steve was consistantly posting times in the high 11 sec. mark.(11.8612 & 11.8634)

No one else broke the 11 sec. barrier, although several came close.

Keeping a very close distance were fellow skaters Tom Inouye, Steve Evans, Paul Hacket, Tony Alva, Steve Alba, Mike Goldman, Curt Kimbel and amateur Jay LaPalm. They all were posting their runs in the low 12 sec. mark.

Surprisingly, the Roller Skaters were all bunched up with each other with very close times.

Guys like Fred Blood, Duke Rennie, John Hawthorne, Jerry Bregman, Greg O'Neil, had low 12 sec. marks.

We though that they may have been faster than skate-

boarders, but this wasn't the case.

SKATEBOARDING

Of the 19 skateboarders(2 didn't make the qualifying round), only ten would go to the Finals.

The course was layed out as a very fast course, with seven cones placed criss-cross from each other on the banked walls.



After the last banked cone, the course dumped the skater onto the high banked turn, where there were three more cones to be cleared, thereafter, the skater had to push up the course and cross the timing lights.

As expected, first to qualify, with an 11.8634 sec. run was Steve Olson. He looked very fluid and in total control at all times.

Second to qualify with a 12.0961 was Mike Goldman, another Santa Cruz skater. Mike looked tight on his runs, but this may have proven to be beneficial, as he realy attacked every cone.

Next to qualify was a surprising Tom Inoye. Tom had a best run of 12.1456.

Although he's not been making too many Pro events lately, he looked like he was ready for this one.

Perhaps the fact that Tom and many skaters around his time, who got into skate-boarding before the advent of Parks, got their training on banks, drain basins, etc., may have proved to be an advantage for him.

Following Tom, was another contemporary, Tony Alva. Tony posted a 12.1550 sec. to qualify for the Finals.

Qualifying in 5th, and a fraction of a second(1/100th) behind Alva, was Steve Alba with 12.1681.

The remaining five skaters to qualify were: Paul Hacket (12.1725); Charley Ransom (12.2048); Steve Evans(12.2116); Curt Kimbel(12.2460); and in 10th, amateur Jay LaPalm(12.2265).

ROLLER SKATERS

As we said before, all the times posted by Roller Skaters were very close to each other. No one seemed the sure winner.

We were surprised that they were not faster than Skateboarders. As a matter of fact, roller skaters seemed to be spending their energy as a faster rate than the four-wheeled skaters.

Perhaps it's the fact that many roller skaters have been concentrating too much on pools and bowls and not enough on other types of events

Of the 13 skaters enetered, only 10 made it to the finals.

FINALS

There was very little doubt that if Steve Olson did not fall or hurt himself, there was little chance anyone could beat him. He was flawless. His runs were smooth and consistant and although a bit slower than on his qualifying runs, he still posted a 11.9303 sec. to win the \$500.00 First place prize.

Four/100th of a second behind Steve was Charley Ransom(ICK STICK), with a very fast 11.9758. He was the only other skater to break into the 11sec. mark. His 2nd place earned him \$450.00.

Steve Evans, also from ICK STICKS, placed 3rd. with a 12.0922 and won \$400.00.

The following 4th through 10th place were;

Fourth Tom Inoye(CASTER) 12.1284 and \$350.00; 5th place to Curt Kimbel, 12.1922 and \$300.00; 6th. Steve Alba(INDY) 12.2052 and \$250.7th. Paul Hacket(ALVA) 12.2186 and \$200.; 8th. Tony Alva(ALVA) 12.2308, \$150.9th Mike Goldman(SANTA CRUZ) 12.2978, \$100. and in 10th place it was amateur turned Pro on that day, Jay LaPalm 12.4207 and \$75.00.

Surprisingly, one the top Slalom skaters in Southern California, Bill Hanes from VARIFLEX, did not make the cut.

ROLLER SKATE

Maybe because Roller Skating competitions in Parks is relatively new, there is no dominat figure in this category.

Guys like Fred Blood, Duke Rennie have been the front runners, but on this day it was a new face in the winners spot.

VARIFLEX's John Hawthorne, finally got a taste of the top prize. His first place earned him \$250. As evidenced on our cover photo, John was dead serious about winning this event.

He attacked every cone and pushed and pumped as hard as possible.

He regarded this course as an excellent course, one that depended on the skater's ability and not on his wheels. "I loved it" was his comment.

John's time was 12.1894.

Placing in 2nd. was Fred Blood,(BLOOD SKATES & PARK RIDER WHEELS). Fred earned \$225. thanks to his 12.3614 sec. posting. Third went to Duke Rennie (ROAD SKATES) with 12.3975 good for \$200.00

Fourth was Jerry Bregman with 12.4141 and \$175.

Fifth through 10th were as follows: 5th. Tim Crawford, 12.5089 and \$150.; 6th. Lee Clemons 12.5157, \$125.; 7th. Greg O'Neil, 12.5179, \$100.; 8th. Pete Stewart, 12.5879 and \$75.; 9th was Naomi Hall, 12.7261 \$50.(the only girl to qualify and place in the top ten) and 10th place went to Mike Bridget

with 12.8700 and \$25.

We know for a fact that there are many other park owners who would like to stage similar Pro events, but based on the turn out of this event, it is going to be difficult to convince them that it's even possible to break even.

It's a shame, because an event like Slalom is a very exciting event. Specially for the general public. They may not understand the intricacies of pool riding, but they do understand speed and elapsed times and the elements of danger connected with the sport.

We believe the the Slalom events could be the catalists to bring skateboarding to Television.

We need to continue to support these events.




Two different styles to get the same results. Fred Blood (above) in the conventional style, Duke Rennie(below) in the split form.
